Locus of Control and Attributional Style Inventory: Locus of control orientation refers to our beliefs about whether the outcomes of our actions depend on what we do (internal control orientation) or on events outside our personal control (external control orientation). Our attributional style determines which forces we hold responsible for our successes and failures. Both locus of control and attributional styles have great influence on our motivation, expectations, self-esteem, risk-taking behavior, and even on the actual outcome of our actions.
