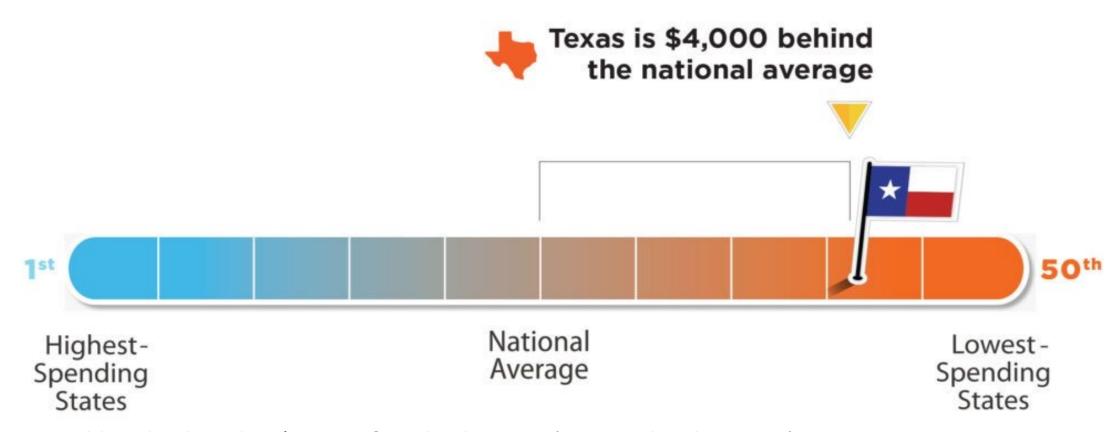

## Why Texas school funding still isn't fair







### School Cost Inflation 2019 vs. 2023

Schools, just like our households and businesses, have seen increased costs for fuel, insurance, utilities, and supplies. In addition, districts have continued to provide salary increases in order to retain and hire quality staff.



Fuel +97% \$583.604



Insurance +204% \$3,471,031



Utilities +30% \$2,073,834



**Transportation** +14% **\$1,860,221** 



**Staffing/Raises** +10% **\$22,411,768** 

Average inflation since August 2019 has increased by 17% according to the Consumer Price Index.



### Insufficient, Complex State Funding Formula

- The primary funding of schools in Texas is what is known as the "Basic Allotment"
  - HB 3 in 2019 raised the basic allotment to \$6,160
  - Unless the Legislature takes action in the 4<sup>th</sup> Special Session schools will have gone 5 years without an increase.
  - The basic allotment would need to be over \$7,100 to compensate just for inflation.

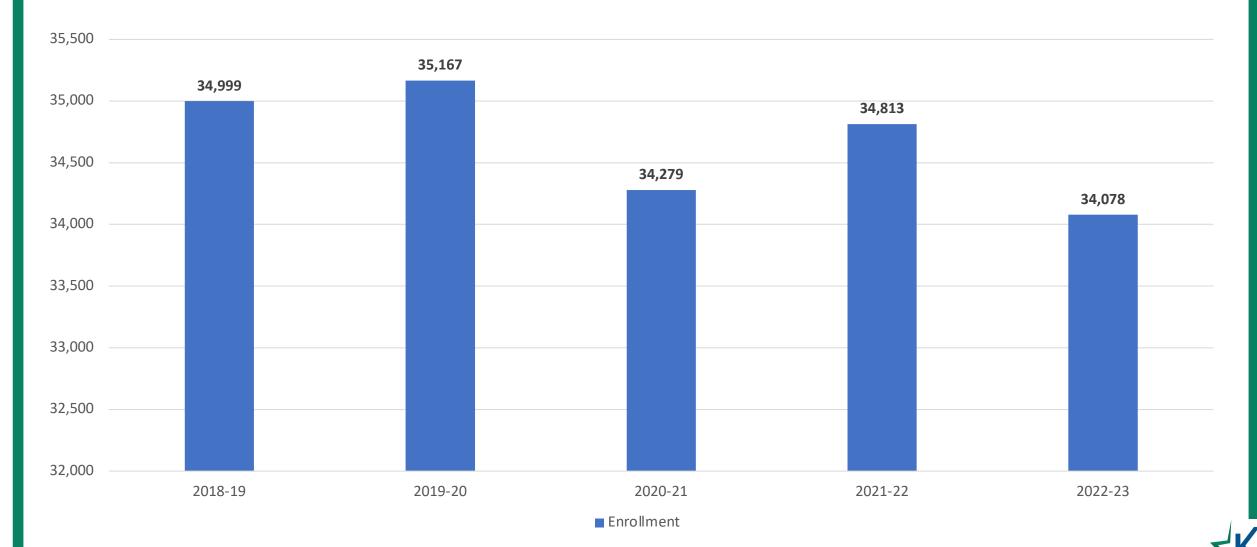

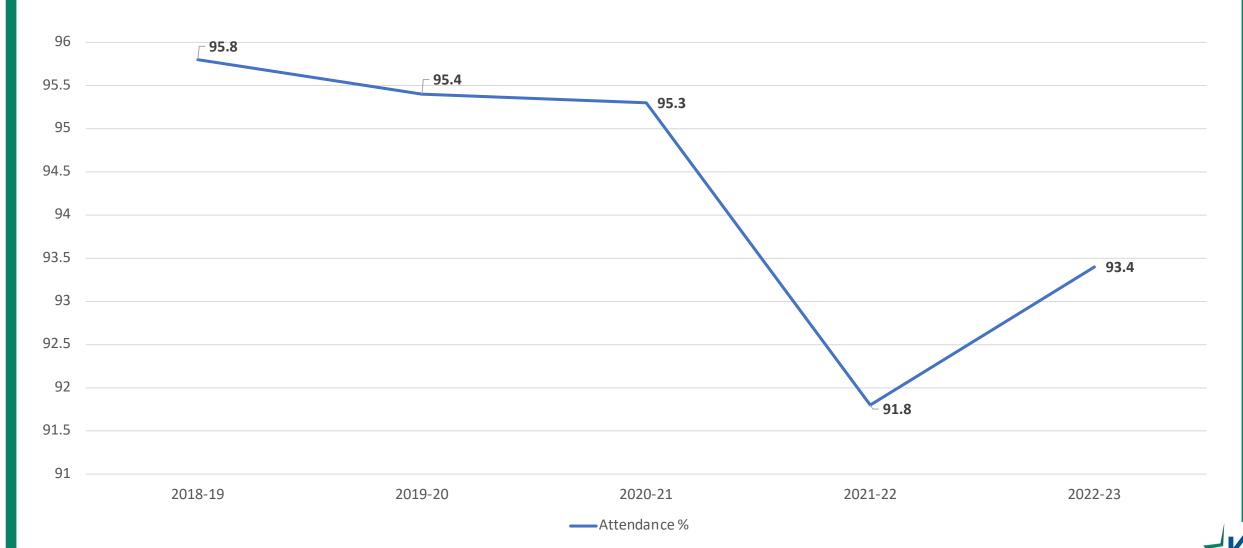

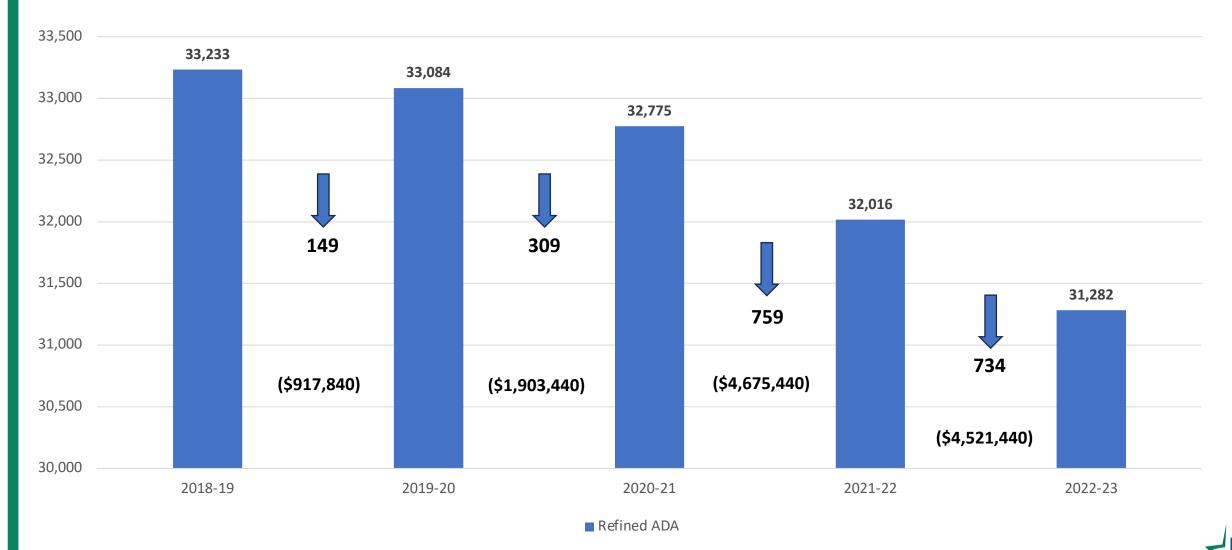
### **Declining Enrollment**



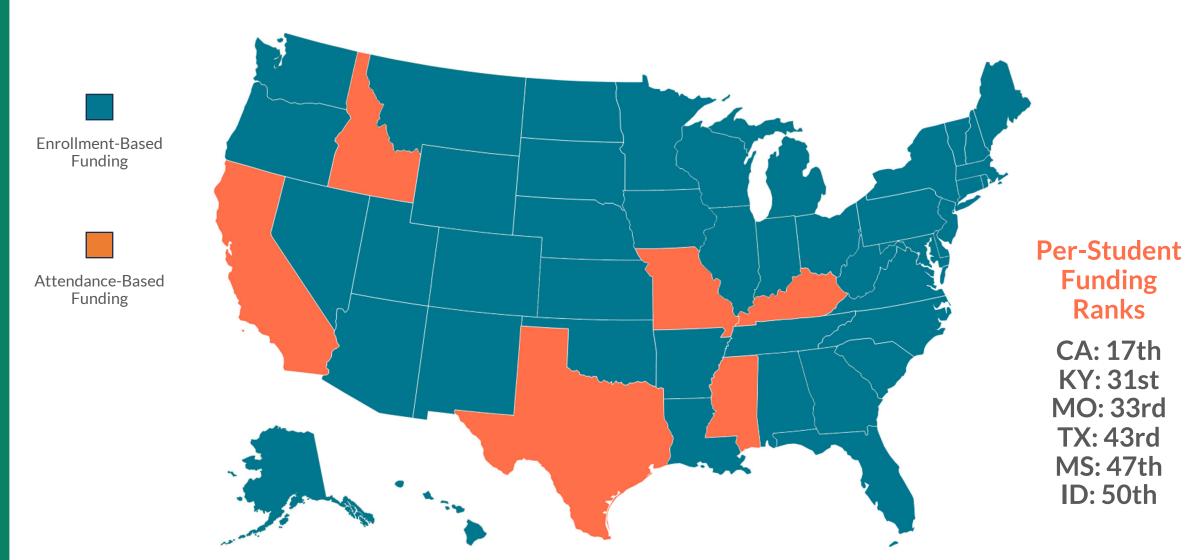
### **Declining Attendance**

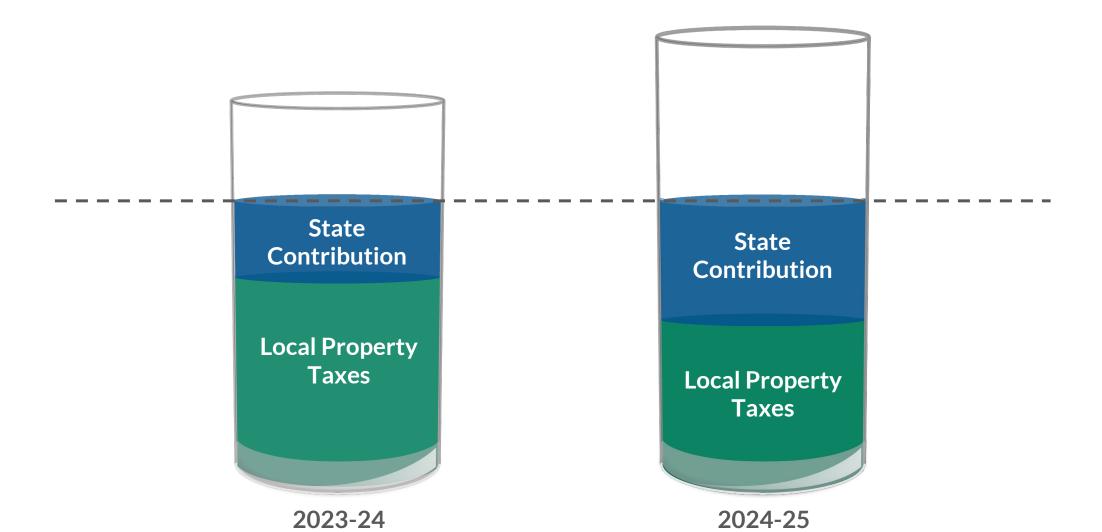

The updated comptroller's report raises the amount of revenue available to the state over the 2024-25 cycle to \$194.6 billion.

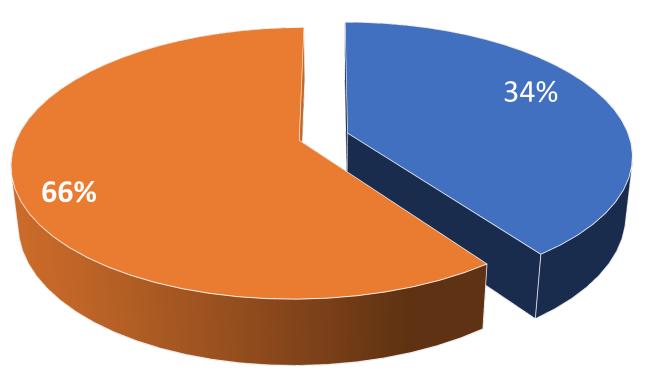


### Cost of Educating a Student





### Restricted vs Unrestricted Funds \$437 million

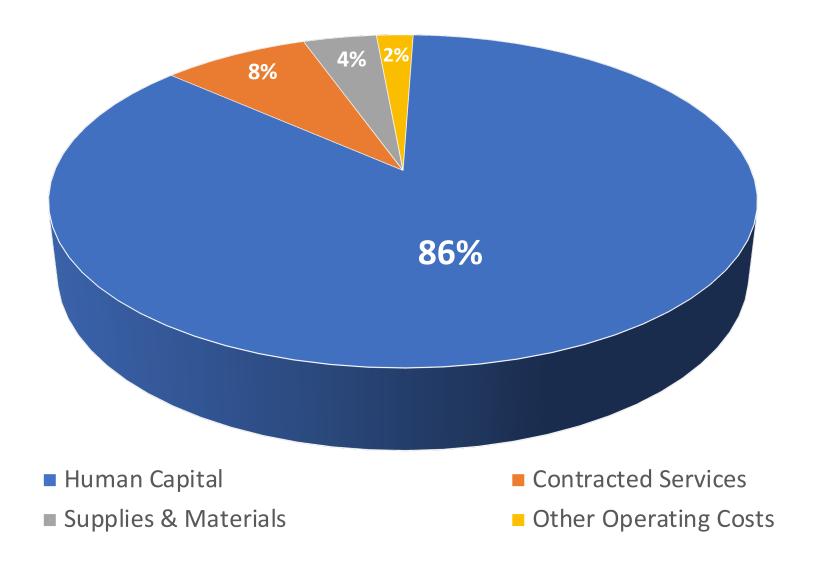

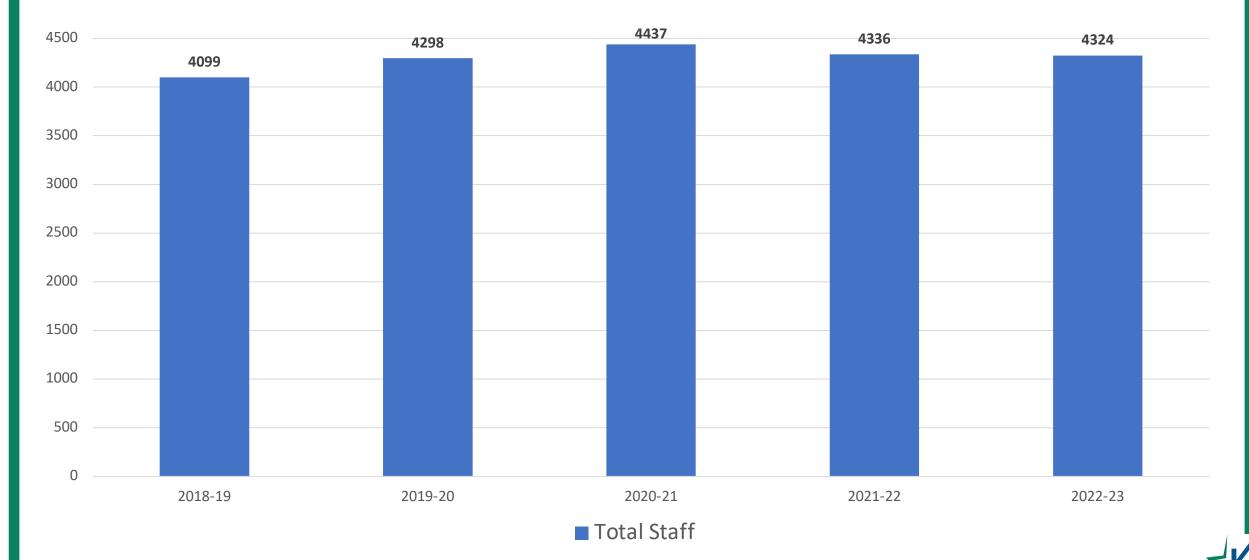

### Operating Revenue vs Expenditures

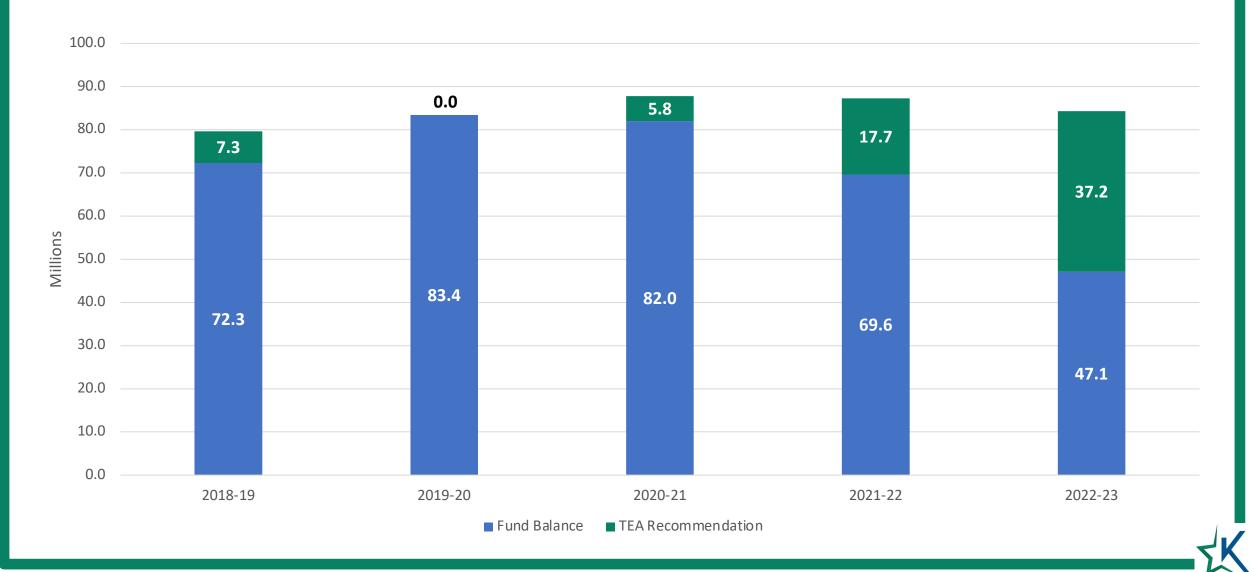


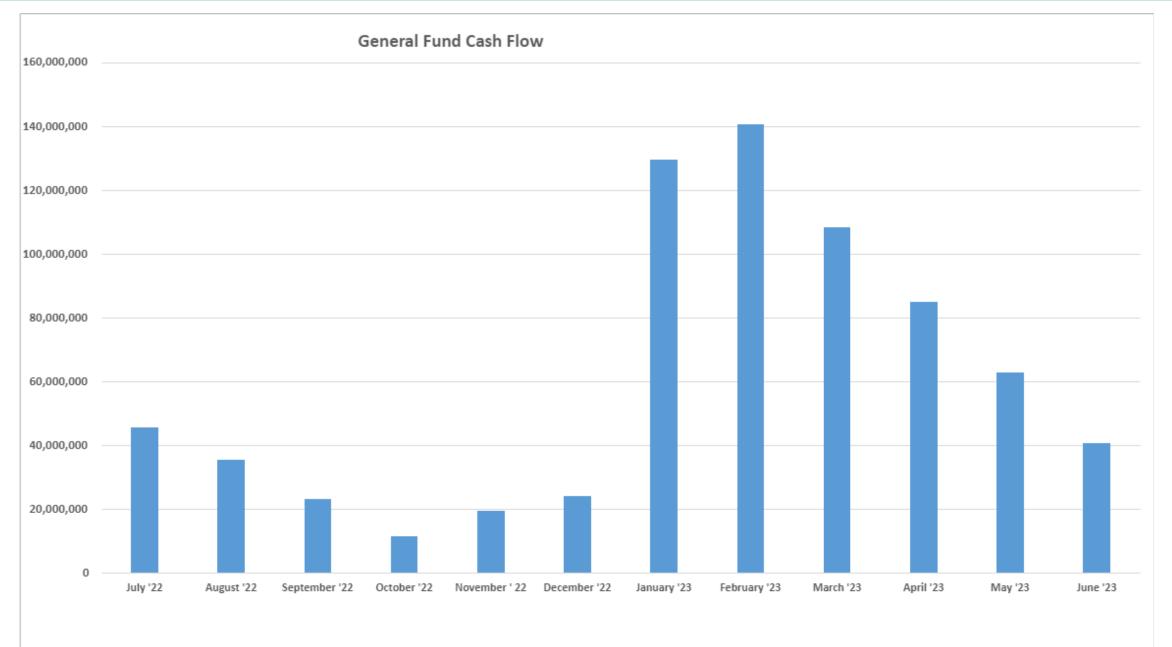
### **Increases to Operating Expenditures**

- 2019-20 (\$314.8M) vs 2020-21 (\$324.6M)
  - Increase in Payroll Costs of \$8.9M (2% of midpoint raise for all staff and market adjustments cost \$7.2M)
  - Increase in Utilities of \$0.6M
  - Increase in Property & Casualty Insurance of \$0.3M
- 2020-21 (\$324.6M) vs 2021-22 (\$334.8M)
  - Increase in Payroll Costs of \$7.5M (2% of midpoint raise for all staff and market adjustments cost \$6.0M)
  - One-Time Employee Retention Payment of \$1,000 to full-time employees, \$500 to part-time employees and up to \$500 to substitutes cost \$4.0M
  - Increase in Utilities of \$0.9M
  - Increase in Property & Casualty Insurance of \$1.2M
- 2021-22 (\$334.8M) vs 2022-23 (\$342.2M)
  - Increase in Payroll Costs of \$6.2M (2% of midpoint raise for all staff plus strategic adjustments cost \$8.5M-unusually high vacancies reduced overall payroll increase to \$6.2M)
  - Increase in Utilities of \$0.8M
  - Increase in Property & Casualty Insurance of \$0.4M
