WHAT IS LES READING OLYMPICS?

A voluntary reading program designed to motivate LES students to incorporate reading into their daily lives and foster a lifelong habit of learning.

HOW DOES LES READING OLYMPICS WORK?

Students and parents who participate must sign a contract agreeing to read books from category areas on their reading list. All students who reach their goal will receive special recognition at LES Awards Day.

DO I HAVE TO READ ONLY BOOKS ON THE READING LIST?

No. This <u>suggested</u> reading list is only to help you find books in each category area. You may read books from the list, but you may also find other books that fit under each category area. Your parents, teachers, or librarian can help you.

WHAT IF I AM PARTICIPATING IN OTHER READING MOTIVATION PROGRAMS?

Students participating in other reading motivation programs may count books read for those programs towards the LES Reading Olympics program.

HOW DO I VERIFY THAT I READ THE BOOKS?

Record each book (including title and author) on the Reading Log. Make sure the student and parent sign the Log before it is returned to the library. Only the Reading Log needs to be returned. You may keep the Reading List booklet.

WHEN IS MY READING LOG FORM DUE?

The deadline for turning in the Reading Log form is March 19, 2013.

WHAT DO I GET FOR PARTICIPATING?

The most important reward for reading is the satisfaction of entering the kingdom of books. You will meet people, visit places, and experience events you might never encounter otherwise. In addition, medals will be given to those students who meet the requirements for award levels in the program. (Award Levels are listed on the back.)

WHAT ELSE DO I HAVE TO KNOW?

- * Credit will only be given for reading (aloud or silently) a book and/or listening to a book read in its entirety.
- * We encourage the student to do most of the reading; however, it is still a pleasure, as well as beneficial, for older students to have books read aloud to them by their parents and teachers. This is valid for this program.
- * Viewing television, film, or video adaptations of books are excellent complements to literature appreciation, but are not a substitute for reading the books and cannot be counted.
- * Students are required to discuss their books with a parent, relative, guardian, or teacher, however, they are not required to record this on the reading log.
- * We encourage use of the public library, school library, and your own collection of books.
- * The goal of Reading Olympics is to encourage parents and their children to choose and read books together. Because of this we require parents of Reading Olympics students to sign a contract stating that they will help their child reach his or her chosen goal. To help with this, parents themselves may obtain a library card from LES Library and check out 5 books at a time for 2 weeks.
- * Books can only be counted once in one Category.

*John Henry. Julius Lester. Retells the life of the legendary African-American hero who raced against a steam drill to cut through a mountain [Caldecott] (398.21 LES)

Yeh-Shen: a Cinderella Story from China. Ai-Ling Louie. A young Chinese girl overcomes the wickedness of her stepsister and stepmother to become the bride of a prince. (398.2 LOU)

Little Red Cowboy Hat. Susan Lowell. A Southwestern version of "Little Red Riding Hood" in which Little Red rides her pony Buck to Grandma's ranch. (398.2 LOW)

The Three Little Javelinas. Susan Lowell. A Southwestern adaptation of the "Three Little Pigs." (E LOW)

Mabela, the Clever. Margaret MacDonald. An African folktale about a mouse who plays close attention to her surroundings and avoids being tricked by the cat. (398.2 MAC)

The Twelve Dancing Princesses. Marianna Mayer. A young man finally discovers how the king's 12 daughters wear out their shoes every night, while they are supposed to be sleeping. (398.2 MAY)

*The Talking Eggs. Robert D. San Souci. A southern folktale in which kind Blanche, following the instructions of an old woman, gains riches, while her greedy sister makes fun of the old woman and is duly rewarded.

The Adventures of Taxi Dog. Debra & Sal Barracca. Maxi the dog tells the story of his rescue by taxi driver Jim and his adventures riding uptown and down in the taxi. (E BAR)

<u>Clean Your Room, Harvey Moon!</u> Pat Cummings. Harvey tackles a big job-cleaning his room! (E CUM)

If You're Not Here, Please Raise Your Hand: Poems about School. Kalli Dakos. Over three dozen entertaining school poems. (811 DAK)

<u>Feathers for Lunch.</u> Lois Ehlert. An escaped house cat encounters twelve birds in the back yard but fails to catch any of them and has to eat feathers for lunch. (E EHL)

*Beast Feast. Douglas Florian. Twenty-one animals, from the walrus to the kiwi cavort across their own double pages with a large watercolor on one side and a zingy word-playing poem on the other. [Bluebonnet] (811 FLO)

<u>Little Dog and Duncan.</u> Kristine George. A collection of children's poems about two dogs. (811 GEO)

*Toasting Marshmallows: Camping Poems. Kristine O'Connell George. Thirty poems that depict the experience of camping. [Bluebonnet] (811 GEO)

<u>Bugs.</u> David Greenberg. Celebrates the disgusting and horrible things you can do with a bunch of bugs. (E GRE)

*Pieces: A Year in Poems and Quilts. Ann Grossnickle Hines. Poems about the four seasons, as reflected in the natural world, are accompanied by photos of quilts made by the author. [Bluebonnet] (811 HIN) *Hush! A Thai Lullaby. Mintong Ho. A Thai lullaby that asks animals to be quiet and not disturb the sleeping baby. [Caldecott] (811 HO)

A House is a House for Me. Mary Ann Hoberman. A rhyming book about a variety of dwellings. (E HOB)

*The Spider and the Fly. Mary Botham Howitt. An illustrated version of the well-known poem about a wily spider who preys on the vanity and innocence of a little fly. [Caldecott] (821 HOW)

*Dirty Laundry Pile: Poems in Different Voices. Paul B. Janeczko, ed. A scarecrow, washing machine, cow, and other objects and animals express themselves in this collection of poems. [Bluebonnet] (811.008 JAN)

Gold Fever. Verla Kay. In this brief rhyming story set during the gold rush, jasper leaves his family and farm to pursue his dream of finding gold. (E KAY)

<u>Tikki Tikki Tembo.</u> Arlene Mosel. How Chinese people change their names. (398.2 MOS)

Zin! Zin! Zin! A Violin. Lloyd Moss. A rhyming introduction to the orchestra, counting up to a chamber group of ten. (E MOS)

Silver Seeds. Paul Paolilli, Dan Brewer, Steve Johnson and Lou Fancher. A collection of simple poems having to do with nature. (811 PAO)

One Hundred Hungry Ants. Elinor Pinczes. A hill of hungry ants marches off to their picnic in a long row, when the littlest ant realizes that they'll get there quicker if they and regroup in lots of other ways, allowing readers to use their division skills. (E PIN)

The Carp in the Bathtub. Mollie Cohen. A carp is adopted by a family instead of being cooked for Passover. (FIC COH)

The Tub People's Christmas. Pam Conrad. The frightened Tub People witness Santa's visit on Christmas Eve, and even though they do not understand what is happening, they become beautiful ornaments on the Christmas tree. (E CON)

Rattletrap Car. Phyllis Root. Various disasters threaten to stop Poppa and the children from getting to the lake in their rattletrap car. (E ROO)

Marvin Redpost: Kidnaped at Birth? Louis Sachar. Redheaded Marvin is convinced that the reason he looks different from the rest of the family is that he is really the lost Prince of Shampoon. A series. (FIC SAC)
